Entire year-search for scholarship opportunities

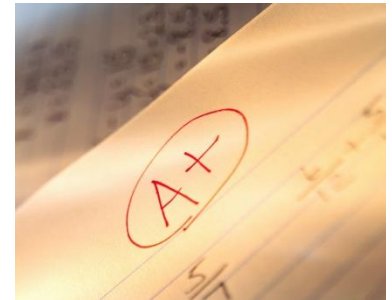
- ACT

# How to prep for college/technical schools

- Schools utilize freshman, sophomore and junior year grades for admission.
- Continue involvement in school- or community-based extracurricular activities.

# Career Cruising

- This is a new career exploration tool that you will be utilizing in classes and during guidance lessons (similar to Career Locker but with enhanced features)
- You will need to be able to access this program in order to track your applications, request letter of recommendation, and to make transcript requests

# Things to do in Career Cruising

- **My Saved Schools**- If you are interested in any school you can save it and then Mrs. Taylor can send invites if reps are coming to GHS
- Utilize **My Scholarships & Financial Aid**
- Invite parents/guardians
- Fill out **Personal College Profile** (to replace letter of rec request form)
- Utilize Campus Visit Forms in Career Cruising

# Requesting Transcripts in Career Cruising

Here's how students can initiate transcript requests from My Plan:

- Log in to Career Cruising.
- From **My Plan**, click **My Education**.
- Select **My Transcripts**.
- Click **Send Ad-Hoc Transcript Request**.
- Select the destination for your request. If the NCAA is the destination, confirm the request. If the destination is a college, click a state and then choose the college by name.
- Click **Send Now** to confirm the request.

# FAFSA

- **Students now able to submit a FAFSA® earlier.** Students will be able to file a 2018–19 FAFSA as early as Oct. 1, 2017, rather than beginning on Jan. 1, 2018. The earlier submission date will be a permanent change, enabling students to complete and submit a FAFSA as early as October 1 every year.
- **Students will use earlier income information.** For example, on the 2018–19 FAFSA, students (and parents, as appropriate) will report their 2016 income information, rather than their 2017 income information.



- Continue to keep track of all of the extracurricular and volunteer activities you participate in, leadership positions you hold, and any honors/awards you receive. Build your resume. (This can be done in Career Cruising too under **My Activities and Experiences**)
- Register with NCAA Clearinghouse by the end of your junior year if you want to play competitive sports in college (Division I or II).

# Letters of Recommendation

- Not everyone needs one
- Bubble kid example or if it is explicitly required by a school or for a scholarship
- Always request letters in person, give teachers adequate time to write the letter (2-3 weeks), fill out the Personal College Profile in Career Cruising and e-mail it to teachers AFTER you have kindly requested the letter in person.
- Make sure to write a thank you note.
- No more than 3 letters are needed (1-2 well written letters will suffice)
- Should be from a core area teacher (English, Math, Science, Social Studies)
- Unless you are applying to a specialized program i.e. You are applying to an art school, then a letter from an art teacher would be appropriate

- Work on essay topics for scholarships and/or college admissions.
- Search for possible scholarship opportunities.
- Utilize the School Counseling homepage found on the GHS website
  - FAQ section
  - Scholarships
  - Career Information links
  - Post-secondary options
  - Career Cruising

# Researching Schools

- Go online to colleges' /universities' websites to request information.
- Get to know the admission criteria for your top schools. Know where you stand in relation to those requirements and work toward changing what you can (if you fall short). Ex. Re-taking ACT
- Attend college fairs and talk to college representatives.

- **Use College Research Form available in school counseling office.**

# Campus Tours and Preview Days

- Visit colleges-take along a college visit question form (available in the school counseling office or on our website)
- A campus tour or preview program is a great way to see if a college campus might be the right fit. It is guided and usually includes a meeting with an admissions representative.
- Preview programs often include a campus tour and meeting with representatives from student services offices, admissions, academic departments, and/or current students.

# Other Helpful Tips...

- Set up a college admissions E-mail account. Keep it professional!
- Keep a college admissions notebook & folder with user names and passwords as well as any other info.
- Draft an admission “brag sheet”. Highlight accomplishments & accolades.
- Review your online persona. Examine info on Facebook or other social networks. Schools can access this information about you.
